
Synopsis:

What is a Dodo?

Before reading the book, or even showing the cover, ask the class if anyone knows what a Dodo is?

What's special about the Dodo?



Using just a verbal or written description, ask the students to draw a Dodo.

Either write the description on the board and have student draw their birds, or use the sheet on the next page.

When all of the Dodos have been drawn, show scientific images, and see how they compare. (A Google search for Dodo bird, will provide many examples)

English

In the story Danny is not looking forward to the boring summer holidays at his Grandmothers house.

Ask the students to describe their favourite holiday.

What made it so good?

Has anyone been on or had a bad holiday?

Describe a bad holiday, and what made it so bad?





Science Year 5

In the books we find out information about Dodos. Such as what they eat, where they're from, but also why they have such small wings.

There were no predators on the island of Martitius in the time of the Dodo, so they no longer needed to be able to fly, so over they years their wings became smaller as they did not need to use them.

Research other animals that have made changes/adaptations because of their surroundings.

HASS - Geography:

Dodos came from Mauritius.

Ask students if they know where in the world Mauritius might be

Find Mauritius on a Map/Globe/Google Earth

Google Earth may be a good option, as Mauritius is barely very small and difficult to see on a globe.



As a class find out the basic information about Mauritius:

Locate on a map Population Flag Currency Languages spoken

Individually or in small groups, see what other interesting facts students can find out about Mauritius. The internet may be the best as there have been few children's books published about Mauritius.



Draw a Dodo

Description of a Dodo

- Large plump bird
- Small wings
- Gray feathers on their bodies and tails with white plumes
- Short, thick yellow legs ending in 4-toed feet with black claws.
- Large hooked beaks, which were either pale yellow or green in colour.
- 152cm and weighed about 18kg when full grown.

I think a Dodo would have looked like this...
