ABOUT THE BOOK

Yesterday Crumb is no ordinary girl. She was born with fox ears that have cursed her to a lonely life working in the circus and her origins are a complete mystery. But she is about to escape into the adventure of a lifetime when she learns that she's a strangeling who's lost her magic.

Yesterday starts to rediscover her magic and to feel a sense of belonging. But a mysterious figure of darkness is working hard to ensure her new life comes crashing down - and it all starts with a deadly shard of ice in Yesterday's heart...

But there's nothing that can't be solved with a pot of tea, a slice of cake and a big dash of magic!

CONTENTS:

Theme 1 – Magical Tea Recipes

Activities: Research teas from around the world. Write your own recipe for a magical tea.

Objectives: Retrieve, understand and apply information from fiction and non-fiction texts. Write instructions.

Theme 2 – Magical Creatures

Activities: Research mythical creatures. Draw Yesterday Crumb. Create your own magical witch and write a description inspired by an extract from the text.

Objectives: Read as a writer. Use strong descriptive language and language techniques such as similes.

Theme 3 – A Place Where You Belong

Activities: Identify positive, encouraging words and thoughts. Reflect on encouraging people in our own lives and places where we belong.

Objectives: Understand that everyone has potential and value. Appreciate and recognise similarities and belonging.



THEME 1: Magical Tea Recipes

EXTRACT 1

In this extract, Yesterday tries to follow a recipe from *The Tome of Terrific Tea Witchery* for the very first time.

She chewed her lip, thinking carefully. Why couldn't *she* make the Jumbling Jasmine? *Surely, all I have to do, she thought, is follow a recipe. How hard could it really be?*

First, Yesterday crept back into the tearoom, sneaking past Jack, who was now busy cutting a slice of unicorn-milk cheesecake on the counter. On her tiptoes, she reached for one of the teapots from their shelves. She didn't have time to pick carefully, so she grabbed a simple white one before anyone noticed what she was up to.

Teapot in hand, she returned to the kitchen. She went to the cupboard from which she had seen *The Tome of Terrific Tea Witchery shoot* out the night before and carried the book over to the table by the window. She turned to the contents page and scanned it until she found *Jumbling Jasmine*.

'It's only tea,' she said to herself, flicking to the right page. 'What could be so tricky about *tea*?' She reached the recipe and read it through.

Jumbling Jasmine, or the Zoo in a Brew Difficulty Level: Considerably Tricky

Ingredients

One tsp ground cinderspice
One tsp finely chopped toothweed
A pinch of jasmine petals
One teapot's worth of unicorn milk (boiled, preferably by tea spirit, salamander, or dragon)
Optional: pickled starlight, to extend the magic's longevity.

'Toothweed!' Yesterday said, recognising it as the plant Miss Dumpling had plucked in the tea garden. She peered into the pantry and traced her finger along the shelves. 'Sphinx Spit . . . Hydra Oil . . . Leprechaun Moustache Bristles . . .' She grimaced, wondering how those things could ever be used to make something delicious. 'Here it is! Toothweed.'

She took one of the leaves from a little tin and fished some white jasmine petals from a glass jar. As she left the pantry, she grabbed a pint of white unicorn milk. She brought the ingredients back to the table by the window. She longed to have the kitchen respond to her needs and commands as it did for Miss Dumpling. But it seemed that a kitchen only answered to its witch, and the very idea of Yesterday having one of her own was as distant and wishful as a falling star.

- What is the name of the recipe book?
- Does Yesterday think it's going to be difficult? How do you know?
- What does Yesterday notice about the ingredients?
- Does Yesterday think she'll ever have a kitchen of her own? How do you know?

ACTIVITY 3:

Write the steps you need to follow to make the perfect cup of tea.



THEME 2: Magical Creatures

EXTRACT 2

The Pocket Book of Faeries is one of Yesterday's only possessions.

Instead, she tried to ignore the voices, and disappear into her one and only book. It was only small, no bigger than her palm, and was practically falling apart these days. The title on the front cover read *The Pocket Book of Faeries* and there was a picture of a man with dragonfly wings underneath.

It was a kind of storybook, written like a birdwatcher's guide, only for made-up creatures rather than real ones. Even so, every time Yesterday read it, she pretended that such creatures really existed. That there were river trolls who lived under bridges and feasted on moss and syrup for their supper. That there were pixies the size of toadstools who were born every time someone fell in love. That there were goblins who travelled the world with their markets, trading their wares in exchange for your earliest memories or the last years of your life.

Yesterday flipped open the cover, lingering briefly on the torn fragment of paper that should have been the book's first page. All that was left of it was a little scrap in the corner, on which her name, *Yesterday*, was written, and nothing more.

The book had been found by Yesterday's side, her only possession, when the ringmaster had discovered her as a baby outside his tent twelve years earlier. Yesterday often wondered who had left her the book and had written her name in it, and if it was the same person who had left her all alone at the circus, but finding out the answers to such questions was not a luxury afforded to the Amazing Fox Girl.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

- Why is The Pocket Book of Faeries so special to Yesterday?
- What is unusual about the man on the cover of the book? What kind of creature do you think he is?
- What sorts of creatures are described in the book?
- What is written on the torn first page?
- Where was Yesterday left as a baby? Why do you think this was?
- What is Yesterday's other name? What does this tell you about how she is treated?
- "...but finding out the answers to such questions was not a luxury afforded to The Amazing Fox Girl." What does this sentence mean?
- Yesterday is a girl with ginger hair, pale skin and fox ears yet believes this book is about made-up creatures. Why might Yesterday have this special book?



ACTIVITY 1:

Discover Magical Creatures

ACTIVITY 2:

Draw Yesterday Crumb

Yesterday is a very unique girl. She is described at the beginning of chapter one.

There was once a girl named Yesterday Crumb, and that was not even the most peculiar thing about her. For one, she lived and worked in a travelling circus, even though she was only twelve years old. For another, her hair was the colour of pumpkins, fiercer than any shade of ginger you have ever seen before, while her skin was so pale it was almost silver.

Oddest of all, instead of ordinary human ears, she had the pointed ears of a fox, reddish-brown and tipped at the end with the black of burnt toast. They poked out from her tangle of hair, and even though they were fairly small, any vixen worth her claws would tell you they promised to be marvellous in the future.

Draw a picture of Yesterday that captures her unusual features. You may find it works well to sketch lightly in pencil first. Then go over the pencil lines with a black pen before adding colour using coloured pencils. When you begin sketching, keep your pencil lines light. This means you can draw lots of lines as you work out the shape of Yesterday's face and ears then rub out any you don't need later.



ACTIVITY 3:

Design your own witch

Later in chapter one, Yesterday discovers that faeries are real and she is actually a witch! Her fox features are a result of witches being forced out of human society and reconnecting with the magic of the wild.

Can you design a witch with animal features like Yesterday? Decide which animal your witch will resemble. Add some animal features such as hooves, horns, a snout, a tail, claws, whiskers, fur, scales or something else.

Draw your witch below and label any animal features. Try to include lots of detail.

Write a description of your witch using the description of Yesterday in Activity 2 as inspiration. Use carefully chosen vocabulary to help readers imagine your character. Use similes and comparisons to help explain the colours and shapes.

THEME 3: A Place Where You Belong

EXTRACT 3

In this extract, Yesterday has arrived at Miss Dumpling's travelling teashop and discovers that maybe she isn't so different after all.

Miss Dumpling gave Yesterday a serious look. 'Darling, this isn't over until the kettle's boiled. We came here tonight because the tealeaves told me there was a lost strangeling in need of our help, and we shall not let you down.'

'You came here just for me?' said Yesterday.

Miss Dumpling smiled mischievously. 'Why, darling, of course! Rescuing lost strangelings is what Dwimmerly End is all about.'

Yesterday felt like she was glowing. For the first time in her life, she mattered to someone.

'And while you're here, darling, we have unicorns that need milking, plants that need pruning, and cakes that need baking. You could be just the ticket. Indeed, I have been looking for an apprentice for some time. How would you like to do some magic of your own?'

Yesterday could not believe what she was hearing. 'You want me to be your apprentice? Aren't you supposed to interview me first?'

'What do you suppose I'm doing right now?' Miss Dumpling said, arching an eyebrow. 'You are a witch, which means possibilities. 'Ordinary is as ordinary does, darling,' said Miss Dumpling with a shrug. 'The finest tea can brew in the humblest of teapots, and don't you let anyone tell you otherwise.'

'I hope I wouldn't disappoint you,' said Yesterday, looking at the floor. 'Or put you in any danger from that monster, Mr Weep.'

'Saucers and silliness! My grandmother used to say that even the fiercest monsters can be slain. That goes for fear, sorrow, and loneliness as much as any demon or dragon. I notice you haven't touched your tea.'

She pushed the cup towards Yesterday.

'This tea is Dreamer's Dandelion, flavoured with sweet dreams and wild wishes,' Miss Dumpling went on. 'One of my favourite witch-brews. Have a sip, and may it inspire you to do mad, marvellous things.'

Maybe I really do have magic. Maybe I could work here, she thought. I could live a life of magic and tea and cake.


I could belong.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

- Has this ever happened to Yesterday before?
- What is an apprentice?
- What does Miss Dumpling mean when she says, 'You are a witch, which means possibilities.'?
- Does this extract give you any ideas about what might happen next in the story?
- Does Yesterday think she has what it takes to be a witch? How do you know?
- What are the fiercest monsters Yesterday needs to slay?
- How is Dreamer's Dandelion the perfect tea for this situation?
- What wonderful thing does Yesterday realise as she drinks the tea?
- What would you do if someone said they felt like they didn't belong or fit in?
- Everyone has the potential or possibility to do wonderful things. Take turns to share with the group, class or family one thing you think someone else would be good at. For example, you might say, 'I think Aleela would be really good at playing football because she's a fast runner.' or 'I think James would be a great nurse because he's really caring.'




ACTIVITY 1:

Encouraging words


