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Synopsis:

Crash-a-rumble Smash-a-grumble What's at work? Here's a clue: It will clear the ground for you. Bulldozer! Coming through! This is the follow-up to Roadworks that will delight tiny truck enthusiasts. It's an engaging, interactive text that asks readers to guess what kind of vehicle is at work. Visual clues alongside the text help ensure that our readers are challenged but can still be successful with their guesses. In the end, the vehicles work together to build a surprise.

This is an expansion on our already-successful Roadworks brand, but it will also delight toddlers who love vehicles and haven't been introduced to Roadworks yet. The interactive format, rhyming text and onomatopoeia (the formation of a word from a sound associated with what is named) make this a strong read-aloud that is just as effective when read one-on-one as it is when read in front of a class-room.

Curriculum links:

Pre Reading Questions

View the cover and title. Ask students to identify:

The title of the book

The author

The illustrator

It also tells us another book written by the same author

Ask students: Looking at the front and back cover, what do you think this book is about?

After reading the book, ask the students if they have seen any of these machines before. Where have they seen them. What were they doing. Where are the places you might see machines like these?

English

As you read the book, ask the students what they notice about the text. Can they see that the same text is repeated on every page .

What's at Work? Here's a Clue:

Encourage the students to join in with this refrain when reading the story out loud.

Point to the words as you go, to encourage word recognition.



Machines:

Look at the last page of the book. It names all of the machines mentioned in the book as well as the important parts of each machine.

Read aloud the parts of each machine. Then reread the story, stopping at each machine to quiz students about the specific parts of the machine and their function.

Talk about the different parts to each machine, and how they help that truck do it's job.

ie: Why is it important for the dump truck to have a swing gate? What would happen if it didn't have a swing gate?
