
Instructions: Choose one of the four habitats you read about in the story. Read the prompt and use what you know about the habitat to answer the question.

Directions	The story helps us build our vocabulary by using words we may not be familiar with. In this task you will use the identified vocabulary words from the story and look up the definition. Then think of a synonym (word that means the same) and an antonym (word that means the opposite) of each word.

Vocabulary: Synonyms & Antonyms

Instructions: Use the vocabulary words in the word bank to fill in the flowers. For each flower you will write the word, definition, synonym, and antonym.

Directions	The author does a great job of using adjectives to describe particular things in the story. Use the sheet to create an adjective alphabet from the story. Start with finding ad- jectives the author uses to describe nouns, making sure to list both on the alphabet sheet. Then use your creativity to think of adjectives for nouns you choose from the story. Example from the story: grand parade My example from the story: busy bee


Alphabet Adjectives

Materials	 "Wonder of Nature Hunt" sheet The great outdoors Pencil Clipboard
Directions	Using the world around you to spark curiosity is what the story is all about. In this task you will go outside to explore the great outdoors looking for specific examples from the "Wonder of Nature Hunt" sheet. Once you find your items, take note of what you notice about each item and what it makes you wonder about. Then on the last page, use your curiosity to find four other objects in nature to explore.

Materials	Haiku planning sheetPencil
Directions	Poetry is also a great way to express one's curiosity about nature. Haikus are a form of poetry that uses a syllable structure to form the poem. Most haikus are about nature. Using the story for inspiration, use the haiku planning sheet to write a haiku of your own. This task can be done individually for older students or together for younger students.

Planning a Haiku Poem

Haiku poems are usually about nature. Use the box to jot down some ideas for your poem using inspiration from the story.

Decide on your topic and then write down words that relate to your topic.

Now it's time to put your ideas to work. Remember a syllable is how a word is broken up into sounds. Holding your hand under your chin (close but not touching) then counting the times your chin touches your hand is a good way to find how many syllables a word has. Don't forget to include a title.

	 Pg. 1 & 2—Looking at the illustrations on these pages, what tells you they are getting ready for an adventure or exploration?
	 Pg. 3 & 4—What do you think the kids are going to do with the items in the blue trunk? What would you do with them?
	 Pg. 5—What does the author mean by "Wonder can sometimes hide in disguise, even to those with eyes open wide?"
	 Pg. 8—Why would we have to look extra closely to see the grand parade? Are there things outside that we often overlook?
	 Pg. 9 & 10—How do the kids in the book feel about rainy days compared to how some other people feel about them? Do you see anything on this page that would be personification?
	 Pg. 11 & 12—Why would the author describe the forest as an enchanted world deep inside? There is a lot to look at in the illustrations on these pages. What would you want to explore further?
	 Pg. 13 & 14—How is under the sea like a city?
	 Pg. 15 & 16—Why are the stars considered an extraordinary sight? What are the kids using to look at the stars? What kind of animal do you see in this picture? Why would they use this animal on this page?
	 Pg. 17 & 18—Our world is full of possibilities. Where would you want to explore next?

• Pg. 19 & 20—How could digging in the earth reveal beauty and surprises? Have you ever found anything while playing or working? What is the chipmunk in the picture doing? Why?

• Pg. 21 & 22-How is wonder different for everyone?

• Pg. 23 & 24—Look at the two boys in the picture. Describe what is happening in each picture. How has the boy changed? How do you know? Now read the page again. What does the author mean?

• Pg. 25 - 28—Why is it important for us to share the good things we experience with others?
