David LaRochelle illustrated by Mike Wohnoutka




Max the Dog talks back to the book in a twist that will have fans of funny early readers howling.

Use See the Cat in your classroom to teach about point of view and dialogue.

Candlewick Press • TEACHER TIPS

- As you read the book, ask your students to consider who is telling the story. How do they know? Define the role of a narrator and note that it is a particular point of view.
- Have your students draw their own characters and write dialogue in speech bubbles.
- Have the class write sentences, then write them again with the word not in them to make sentences with opposite meanings.
- Use See the Cat for a readers' theater script. Encourage your students to consider the punctuation and facial expressions when practicing how their voice should sound when reading aloud.





- 1. Color the pictures on the game pieces.
- 2. Cut the game pieces apart on the dotted lines. Fold each one in half and place them all in a small bowl.
- 3. Each player chooses a different game board.
- 4. On your turn, close your eyes and draw a slip of paper from the bowl. If it matches part of your picture, place it on your board and draw again. Keep drawing until you draw a piece that does not match. Put it back, then the other player takes a turn.
- 5. The first person to complete their game board wins!
