### Write Your Own Story

At the back of the book Oliver Phommavanh has a template for a story cube.

Using Oliver's as an example, create one to show the class how they work.

As a class write a story. Use the story cube to help.

After creating a story as a class, ask each student to create their own Story Cube.

These story cubes can then be swapped between the students, so that they don't use their own cube to write their story.

- After they have written their story, discuss how using the story cube helped them?
- Did the ideas on the story cube take their story into a different direction that the one they may have planned if not using the story cube?
