

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Andrew Daddo has managed to have a crack at just about every aspect of the entertainment industry. He's appeared on TV and stage, presented radio programs and podcasts, and even made movies. Best of all, Andrew is an accomplished author. He has written 28 books including picture books, chapter books, short story collections, novels and a vague biography – he's hard to pin down. He also talks up literacy in schools.

ABOUT THE ILLUSTRATOR

Stephen Michael King has been described as an artist who 'draws from the inside out', and it is this gentle, intuitive truth that gives heart and playfulness to his work. Stephen Michael King is an internationally renowned, award-winning author and illustrator whose career has spanned over thirty years, producing more than one hundred titles. He has worked with a stable of Australia's best children's book authors including Glenda Millard, Margaret Wild, Nick Bland, Peter Carey and Tim Winton. Books that Stephen Michael King has written and illustrated include: *Three*; *Rainbow Bear*; *Mutt Dog!*; *Leaf*; and *Milly, Jack and the Dancing Cat*. His books have been translated into over twenty languages, and he is frequently honoured in children's book award categories – including winning the CBCA Book of the year, and the Prime Minister's Literary Award.

INTERVIEW WITH THE AUTHOR

How did you become an author?

It was almost an accident. Almost. I met a publisher and said, 'Oh, wow, I'd like to write a book.' It seems ridiculous now. Who would say that? But he was very kind and said, 'I'd be interested to read what you've got to say.' I was a bit excited and tried to write a story for about five minutes – it was harder than I'd thought, so I gave it away.

Months later, I met him again, so I said – again – 'I'd still like to write that story.' And he said again, 'I'd be interested...' So, it took ages, about a year, and I finally wrote a picture book. It was called *The Big Green Smiling Wobbly*. To be honest, I don't think it was very good, but

the publisher did suggest writing stories about what it was like growing up in a house full of (naughty) boys. That was fun, and easier than writing a picture book about a Big Green Smiling Wobbly. Once I got started writing stories, I found it hard to stop.

What was your inspiration for writing Bitza?

We have a Bitza of our own. Her name is Peg, she's a beautiful dog who was looking for a home. She has a favourite human, and that's our daughter Jas. In fact, a bit like the story of Bitza, it was Jas who found Peg. And I was the dad who said, 'I don't think she's the dog for us.' Jas was devastated, of course. But I held firm saying to her, 'Even though she's a puppy, her feet are huge. She'll be enormous, like a horse. Do we want a horse? I don't think we have room for one, or a big dog.' Jassy was pretty sure Peg was a dog and not a horse – she was also very sure Peg was the perfect dog to live at our place. Sounds a bit like Jas and Bitza, right? Whilst the story of Bitza is definitely not about them (some of it might be) I'm almost certain they were the main inspiration for Bitza.

Explain a little about how you wrote the story.

Writing the first Bitza book was the most fun I've had writing in ages. I just love writing about dogs, because I love dogs. I love watching them and trying to figure out what they're thinking when they're watching us. A head tilt here, a little 'arooooorh' there. So I watched our other dog Spud (she was called that because she looked like a potato) and I watched Peggy. And, of course, I watched a lot of the dogs down at the park.

The first thing was to find the voice of Bitza – and next was to find a girl (also a bit of a Bitza) to fall in love with him. Then the plan was to have them meet, have them form a bond and then to see what happened. I didn't know the end of the story when I started writing – I never do – except that I knew Bitza would love Jas the way Jas loved Bitza.

What was your favourite book as a kid?

I think it was Enid Blyton's Famous Five series. That was written a looooong time ago. I do recall they were a bit like our own lives. We grew up surrounded by paddocks and spent a lot of time pretending to be somewhere else. We were footy players, cricketers, motorbike riders,



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daredevils – you name it – and it was all made up and really great fun. That was the thing about Enid's books – they were about kids having fun, getting into trouble, getting out of a tight spot and living every moment like it mattered. At least, I think that's what they were about.

What was the most challenging part of writing Bitza?

I suppose the hardest thing about creating Bitza was working out who was telling the story. I loved the idea of Jas being the storyteller, but then really loved the idea of hearing Bitza's perspective on things. Why balls are so great – and sticks and smells and people and going walking and slobbing around all day on the couch. Do dogs understand rules? Do they have dinner times? Do they love being pampered? And most importantly, how much are they listening to us humans, what do they hear and what do they understand? Once it was clear in my head that it was Bitza telling the story, the next hard part was working out how Jas and Dad would get to tell their parts of the story. It was tricky, but it's also great fun. I love dogs – especially our dogs. And I love my kids and the way they love our dogs. Bringing the two together was fun. I hope you love it.

WRITING STYLE

Bitza is written in first person, from the point of view of Bitza the dog, observing and commenting on his life with his human owners.

Questions

1. What are the advantages and disadvantages of only having Bitza's point of view?
2. How does the author communicate the thoughts and feelings of the human characters in the story?

Activities

1. Choose a chapter in the book then try rewriting the chapter:
 - a) from Jasper's point of view.
 - b) in 3rd person (as if you're an invisible observer of everything that's happening and telling us about it)
2. Choose a favourite animal. Do some research into its behaviours and habitat, then write a short story from that animal's point of view.

VISUAL LITERACY

Bitza has fun, bright illustrations on the cover, as well as internal black and white illustrations throughout the book.

Questions and activities

1. How do the illustrations help with understanding the story, as well as the emotions of the characters?
2. Take a look at the cover. What do you think the book will be about?
3. Now read the blurb on the back cover. Add to your previous answer. Is there anything else you feel may happen after reading the blurb?
4. Now read the book. At the end, write down if you guessed the plot correctly. What happened that you expected and what surprised you?

KEY STUDY TOPICS

Belonging

The first book in the Bitza series follows how Bitza finds a new home. There are a few different people who Bitza feels he belongs to, which are conveyed throughout the book.

Questions and activities

1. Can you name some of the times when Bitza feels he belongs with Jas and her dad? What are some things he says or does to convey this?
2. Bitza is written from the point of view of the dog, Bitza. Find some examples in the book of how this writing style helps to convey Bitza's feelings about belonging.

Relationships

Sometimes Bitza, Jasper and Dad think they understand what the other is thinking or feeling but they don't always get it right.

Questions and activities

1. Find an example in the book where there is a misunderstanding between characters.
2. Can you think of a time when you didn't properly understand what someone was thinking or feeling?



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e.g. Perhaps a friend or sibling who is usually talkative seems very quiet, so you might start to wonder what you did to upset them.

3. Talk together about some of the ways you might approach a situation like this with a friend or sibling.
e.g. You might simply ask if they are okay. Or invite them to do an activity with you.

Caring for others

All the characters in the stories show their care for others in different ways.

Questions and activities

1. Create a table with a column for each character in the story and list a few ways they show they care for someone else. (eg Bitza, Dad, Jasper, Peggy)

Responsibility for pets

In the Bitza series, Jasper learns that caring for another living creature is a big responsibility. As she gets to know Bitza, she begins to learn more and more about the best way to keep him healthy and happy.

Questions and activities

1. List some of the things Jasper learns from her dad and from Bitza about how to keep a dog happy and healthy? Divide your list into 2 columns: Tips from Dad & Tips from Bitza.
2. a) If you have a pet, list all the things you do to help keep it happy and healthy. Then do some further research to find out other ways to help you care for your pet. Use the attached a table with tick boxes for each item to be checked off each day.

(b) If you don't have pet, choose a pet that you'd like to care for and do some research to find out the way you could help to provide good care for that pet.

(Remember that having a pet is not always possible for a family to take on for a variety reasons.)






