



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

MAPPING MEMPHIS



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MY MAP

In A History of the World in 25 Cities, you will discover how the map of a city can tell a story about the people who lived there - from what they believed in to where they worked and what they did for entertainment.

Create a stunning display of your own village, town, city or neighbourhood, either as a group or individually, sharing the places that you think are important and matter to you!

Choose your location

This could be where you live, somewhere nearby or a place you've visited before.

Find an existing map of your chosen location

You could check out local maps in your library or online, for example Google Maps. Print or save this map for your reference

Identify the key places you'd like to include on your map

Through researching at your library, online or by asking others such as your teacher, librarian, friends or family. Key places could include major landmarks like statues and buildings, as well as natural features like rivers, mountains and other green spaces like parks. Jot down some key facts about your chosen landmarks - why are they important to the town and its history? Why is the landmark important to the people who live there?

Make it personal

Are there places you have enjoyed visiting or you think are important to your location? Make a note of these and any interesting facts you can find out about them.

Start mapping Using the map you've saved for reference, take a blank piece of paper and draw the outline of your chosen location first to capture the area you want to cover. Don't worry about being accurate - your map will tell a story and not be used to measure the distance between places!

Add your landmarks

Now you have the outline of your area, use a pencil to add in a dot and label for the landmarks you want to include. Once you've added them in, you now have a draft of your map and can see how much space you have to illustrate it. Select landmarks to draw and remember to label them with their name and a short fact if you have space.

Add in details


Now you have mapped out all the highlights of your chosen location, you can start adding in some more detail to your map. For example, are there people walking down the streets? Are there any animals or plants in the area? What are the buildings and houses like? Add colour to your map as well to clearly highlight different areas such as water or greenery. Using A History of the World in 25 Cities as inspiration, see what extra details you can add to your map to bring it to life!

Make sure to give your map a heading so that people know where it is.

Present your map to your class, library group or family and friends. What have you learnt about your chosen location? Which places are most special to you?
