1: Now (pages 2-3)	 Why do you think the author has chosen the four words 'I can steal time' to start this story? How much time can the main character steal at the moment? Which country do they need to get to? Why? Where has the main character ended up? Why is this chapter only two pages long? 	Write a short prediction paragraph about who the protagonist of this story might be, and what has happened to them along their journey so far before reading on and finding out.	MATHS • There are several references to lengths of time during this chapter such as 'three minutes' and 'half of that'. Learn more about measuring time, using the language of time, and telling the time throughout the day.
2: After (pages 5-11)	 On page 5, three police cars are described as being 'parked in a line like crooked teeth'. What literary technique is used here? (simile) Why is it different for Ronnie if he is caught? Why are there passages of text written in italics during this chapter? What does this show? What does the main character mean when he says he 'feels metal round my wrists'? How is the journey over at the end of Chapter 2 according to the main character? Do you think he will get to see his dad? 	In this chapter, Ronnie gets out his mobile phone. Imagine the main character had a mobile phone. 5: Before (pages 33-36)	 Do you notice a change in Grandmother in this chapter? How does the author show that she is growing older? Why does she get angry when Alex asks her if she is 'unwell'? Do you agree that Alex is emotionally distant with people based on his reactions to his grandmother's hug and his teacher when she said she was leaving? Why doesn't Grandmother wish to go to the hospital? What advice does Grandmother give to Aleksander? 	In this chapter, Ronnie gets out his mobile phone. Imagine the main character had a mobile phone. Write an email or instant message to his dad, telling him about what they had just experienced and enquiring about his dad's safety. 12: After (pages 104-115)	 What is the reason why Alex agreed to go with Rachel? What do we learn about Rachel from her home? Who is Hayley? Why doesn't Alex seem to get Rachel's jokes? What is Ronnie's full name, and why does Rachel share it with Alex? What else do we learn about him and the gang? Why does Alex admit that they're not his 'friends'? 	Write a letter from Aleksander to his dad, detailing all the things he wishes he could say to him.	PSHE • Explain the concepts of people smuggling and human trafficking after they have been mentioned in this chapter. Discuss the reasons why this happens and its links to modern slavery, and how to report it to supportive organisations such as the NSPCC.
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13: Before (pages 117-125)	 What has Dad done with the documents to stop the government from getting their hands on them? Why do Aleksander and his dad need to cross over to England so urgently? In which countries would you find Krakow, Prague and Dresden? How did Alex save him and his dad from being killed in the car? What does Alex learn about his mother and his family at the end of this chapter? 	Write a balanced argument about whether Alex or Dad is right about changing the future and the decisions that are made due to the 'gift'.	DRAMA • Create a 'Conscience Corridor'; half of the class stand on one side of the room, persuading Alex that he is right to change the future. Learn about its history, its geography including how it is the nearest French town to England, and the refugee camps that have been situated there. Write an acrostic for the word 'TRUST'. What does this word mean to you?	ART • Draw what the beach and the boat looks like to Alex and Dad. Decide what features you will highlight and discuss your reasons for doing so.
26: After (pages 248-260)	•	Why does Alex reveal his secret to Hayley? What does this show about their relationship and how it has grown? Act out the reaction that Hayley has upon hearing that Alex has a gift of seeing into the future. What confirms to Hayley that she believes that Alex has a gift? Define the word 'meekly' and use a thesaurus to generate synonyms that could replace this word in this sentence. Why does Ronnie say that they have to keep going on towards France for help?	Retell this chapter from Hayley's perspective – consider all the emotions she experiences, particularly towards Alex.	PHILOSOPHY • Alex says "I can't change the future. I can only change what I do now to try and influence things. I have no control over other people." What do you think about this? Do you think we can intervene to change an outcome?

Why does he describe them as 'arms from every part of the world'? What do you think will happen next to Alex, and to Dad?	Write your own ending to the story predicting what you think will happen.	LITERACY • Make a list of five questions that you have about the story at the end of this chapter. What are your predictions?

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28: After (pages 267-278)	•	What does it mean if the rain turns 'torrential'? What sort of hazards are they trying to avoid on the boat? Do you think Alex's power is a gift or a curse? Explain your thinking using quotes from the book. How do they know that they have reached the French coast? What does Booker do with the email account to get rid of the evidence?	Write a diary entry from Rachel before she is dragged across the sand away from Hayley. Consider her thoughts and feelings.	GEOGRAPHY • The UK Border Force is mentioned in this chapter. Look at maps such as those of Europe throughout history and consider how the shape of different countries has changed over time, and investigate the reasons why country borders change.

Rachel says she has permission to take Alex and his Dad back with them but only if they do something. What is it? Who does Alex say can help the investigation? Why is Rachel surprised to hear that it is Ronnie?	Write a summary of how Ronnie has changed from the start of the story. What has he discovered about himself?	LITERACY • Choose two characters from the ones we have been introduced to so far. Create 'Character Templates' by drawing an outline of two people. What words and phrases from the text can you add inside the template to describe what the character is like internally and outside the template to describe what the character is like externally. How are they different from each other?

Why does Alex say that Hayley doesn't know him, even though it feels very much like they met earlier on? What do you think will happen next to Alex, Dad and the other characters?	Write a book review based on your thoughts about the story. Write a letter to Simon Fox telling him your thoughts and feelings about the book. Write a continuation story about what happens to some of the characters.	LITERACY • For each of the main characters in the story, write a sentence summarising how they have developed or what they have learned about themselves.
